It works as a research organization, a support organization and a grassroots implementing organization. INHERE strives to be an open and a learning organization believing in transparency within the organization and with the communities. It has encourages initiatives and experimentation to achieve effectiveness and excellence in its work. INHERE believes in an integrated approach to development encompassing social, economic, human and political development.

Overview 2010-11

The year 2010-11 has been a year of major setback, achievements, challenges and some opportunities. The dominant image for us in the year 2010-11 was the flood of September 2010 which devastated many homes and fields in our district, Almora. Waters of two cloudbursts upstream merged in river Ramganga and washed away INHERE's campus at Patalgaon as well as the demonstration infrastructure on organic agriculture. The floodwaters washed away the entire top soil, all the crops, plants and trees which had been nurtured with great care. It laid bare the foundations of the Ayurvedic pharmacy and INHERE's Rural Resource Centre which served as a training and multipurpose facility, including seed store, for the rural community. What was once good agriculture land is now reduced to a moonscape of boulders and sand. The monetary value of the loss was estimated to be Rs 1.5 crore. The report of this loss, prepared by the technical committee formed by the district administration was forwarded through the District Magistrate to Secretary, Disaster Management, Government of Uttarakhand and response is awaited.

It took us some time to collect ourselves and restore the activities disrupted by the flood. The ayurvedic pharmacy was relocated. The community in Patalgaon gave us land to resume activities in organic agriculture and insisted we stay on. In this time of distress and loss, fellow NGOs and the communities we work with gave us empathy and support which has been a source of strength.

The project on Community Livelihood Promotion through Agro diversity assisted by Sir Dorabji Tata Trust was evaluated by external evaluators with a highly satisfactory assessment. However, this support for INHERE's agriculture programme with small holder mountain farmers was discontinued with Sir Dorabji Tata Trust informing us of their decision to discontinue support to projects in Uttarakhand. This sudden decision disrupted a major programme which was increasing livelihood opportunities for farmers and had also been recognized nationally and internationally for its contribution to mountain agriculture, conservation of agro biodiversity, environment and to increased economic returns for farmers.

The Uttarakhand decentralized watershed development project (Gramya) funded by World Bank Completed fourth year of Implementation. The project achieved 80 per cent of its physical and financial targets. A World Bank mission visited the project villages and mentioned the project as highly satisfactory in its report.

This year INHERE took the decision to initiate an India platform of PROLINNOVA, a programme for promoting local innovations in agriculture. INHERE's case was presented to the PROLINNOVA Oversight Group for consideration and was endorsed by the group. INHERE now has the responsibility to take the initiative forward.

Three new projects were sanctioned and initiated in this year. These include a project for Biomass dryer is being assisted by the Department of Science and Technology, New Delhi , Non Timber Forest Produce cultivation supported by Himoththan Society, Dehradun and establishment of a model nursery of medicinal plants assisted by the Herbal Research and Development Institute, Govt. of Uttarakhand, Gopeshwar, Uttarakhand.

Environment

Environment protection, conservation and restoration is a major concern and area of work for INHERE. The mountain ecosystem and bio diversity are threatened by continuously changing conditions caused by various factors. The changes are affecting the livelihood base of the mountain people. The main project emphasizing environment protection being implemented by INHERE is the Uttarakhand Decentralized Watershed Development which is funded by the World Bank through Watershed Directorate, Government of Uttarakhand. INHERE also undertook in the year water source catchment area protection in 8 ha of 8 villages with support from Sir Ratan Tata Trust.

Uttarakhand Decentralised Watershed Development Project (UDWDP or Gramya Project)

The GRAMYA project is being executed in four micro watersheds of block Chaukhutia and Dwarahat, covering an area of 8024 ha of 46 Gram Panchayat with a population of approximately 22,000 have been directly benefited by the GRAMYA project.

The main thrust of the work during the year was on mass plantation under afforestation (1000 plants/ha), fuel wood plantation (1600 plants/hac) and pasture development (400/800 plants/hac) in the area of forest panchayat and village community land.

Forest panchayats were given responsibility for the plantation work after building their capacity for the purpose through trainings. Prior to plantation preparatory work was undertaken on the land selected. The main activities were trenching, terracing, construction of percolation tanks and pit digging. Preparatory to plantation, 7200 rmt contour terrace and 31560 rmt staggered contour trenches was dug.

A total of 1,07,700 plants of different species of fuel, fodder, timber and medicinal plants were planted in 96.9 hac area. The area covered was 43.9 hac under Afforestation, 36 hac under fuel wood and 18 hac under pasture. The saplings were procured from two demonstration nurseries developed with project support and nurseries developed by individual farmers motivated for this. A total of 75,368 plants were also planted as replacement for mortality in previous year's plantation. After care of plants was taken up by the watchmen deployed for the purpose by the community and forest fire protection by the community itself.

For drainage line treatment and soil conservation, mainly dry stone check dam, create wire check dam, cement masonry check dams, vegetative treatment and river bank protection work was taken up. During the year 2010-11 total 9313.75 cum check dams of above types, 3680 rmt vegetative treatment of bamboo, jatropha, ram bans plantation and 6455 cum river bank protection work was completed.

For enhancing moisture content and reducing top soil erosion in agriculture area, total 13072.5 cum terrace was repaired out of which during 2010-11 6482.48 cum was repaired. This included land leveling, bunding and construction of retaining wall. The results of terrace repairing have been quite encouraging.

Water conservation through different methods like roof rain water harvesting tanks, ground running rain water harvesting cement tanks, irrigation channels, naula and spring improvement was undertaken. In most project villages, all the households now have roof rain water harvesting tanks. Each tank has the capacity to conserve 3000 liters of water. In this year 1645 roof water harvesting tanks were constructed and the cumulative figure reached to 2600 tanks. In this way total 78,00,000 liters/156,000 gallons water conserving capacity has been generated so far for kitchen gardening and domestic use. Twenty eight cement tanks for conserving ground running rain water have been constructed out of which 3 were constructed in this year. The average capacity of each tank is 15000 ltr. Irrigation channels totaling 30.5 kms were made which irrigate 91.77 ha agriculture land of 217 farmers. 114 Naulas/khals have been renovated and improved in the year.

Under pollution control measures in and around the village premises total 1256 no of unhygienic cattle sheds were removed by constructing new improved cattle shed out of which 315 were constructed in this year. During the reporting period 188 no bio vermin compost pits were constructed totaling so far 552 units. Along with this the most important effort for lessening pollution was pine briquetting and saturation of all house holds by constructing low cost toilets in 8 villages. As we all know mass forest fire has become common happening in the month of April to June in the hills, which ruins not only bio diversity but also wild life and whole ecosystem of the area. This is only due to dense layer of pine needles and other dry bio mass covered on the forest ground. The main purpose of promoting pine briquette is to protect environment by checking forest fire and simultaneously to enhance the income of the villagers. During the reporting period 2010-11 total 5 no of pine briquette machines were provided and in total so far is 39 machines to the project villages from which beneficiaries are making briquettes. Not only pine needles but any type of dry bio mass can also be used in it. In this year total 147 qnt. of briquettes was made by 60 beneficiaries and average per beneficiary Rs 2450 income was generated by sale. The demand is increasing of such quality briquettes. Forest Panchayat and other village institutions formed are also playing pivotal role in checking forest fire. In the reporting period 90% planted area was saved by the community. Mass awareness among villagers has been generated through different awareness campaign for protecting environment.

Under safe drinking water and sanitation scheme (Himmothan Pariyojana) all the house holds of 8 project villages have been benefited by low cost toilets. Base line data of these villages reveals that approximately 75 % house holds had no toilet facilities and used to go in open areas which creates not only unhygienic conditions in and around village premises but also lot of problems for specially women and children. Open defecation is a major water pollutant and causes a number of water born diseases. In 8 villages total 189 toilets have been constructed covering 86% households.

Water source catchments area protection is also important work in this scheme. Under this initiative all the water, soil and vegetation conservation measures as has been mentioned above also were taken up in 8 hac area shown in the table below:

Achievement gained by Gram Panchayat :

Total initiatives for watershed treatment area is executed by Gram Panchayat through van Panchayat, users group, samities. The role of supporting organization INHERE is to facilitate and providing total technical support and monitoring in regard to target, time and quality. The achievement gained for watershed treatment work by Gram Panchayat has been described above and detail has been given in following table. The livelihood support activities done by Gram Panchayat has been noted down separately in livelihood support chapter.

Catchment area protection UNDER Himmothan Pariyojana

Catchment area protection work done under Himmothan Pariyojana has been given in the following table. Table reveals the total area treated is 8 hac in 8 villages. The main initiatives are plantation, contour trenching, grass planting, fire line, gabain check dam, dry stone check dams, percolation pits, brushwood check dam etc. Detail is as follows :

Watershed development project team and village level institutions continued to be strengthened through follow up meetings, trainings, workshops and exposure visits during this year as well. As this year was almost the last year for project interventions specially hardware activities so village level institutions were given more attention for keeping the development work and positive community environment sustainable by them after the withdrawal of the project assistance. Following table shows the initiatives taken for the strengthening of the community and village initiatives.

Impacts-

- ☞ Village level institutions like WWMC, RVC, FIG, UG, VG and women's self help group are well informed about their roles and responsibilities in executing community based development programmes and are quite enthusiastic to utilize their leadership capacity and skill in future community based programmes as well.
- ☞ User group (UG) farmers group and women's SHG have generated their own revolving fund for meeting out the expenses to be incurred in maintenance of the assets created, procurement of agro inputs and establishment of other income generating activities after withdrawal of the project assistance. For increasing this revolving fund there is provision of tax for using assets like irrigation facilities etc. monthly saving and interest generated on loan provided to the members.
- ☞ Trained efficient village resource person like 54 account assistant 84 women village motivator and 8 community technician for water schemes have been developed in 52 Gram Panchayat of block Dwarahat, Chaukhutia, Syalde and Salt. These resource personnel are permanent asset of the village and might be used in future programmes.
- ☞ People from left out nearby villages of watershed development and Himmothan Pariyojana villages approaching INHERE for taking up their villages under watershed development (Gramya Project) and water and sanitation Himmothan Pariyojana.
- ☞ Community has saved 90 % afforested area from forest fire and open grazing.
- ☞ 90 % households have adopted roof rain water harvesting technology in rain fed area villages contributing 40 % cost of the roof rain water harvesting tank.
- ☞ Local hats (outlet centers) are being organized by the farmers first time in the area for promoting agribusiness.
- ☞ Seeing the commendable result of watershed and Himmothan projects high recognition can be noticed from the community public representatives for watershed and Himmothan Pariyojana. Suggestion emerged in the block development committee meetings for adopting the norms of above projects in other works also initiated by government through block and other department.
- ☞ Potential of average water availability has been increased 30 % in 92 project villages.
- ☞ 5 individual Kisan nurseries were strengthened and made sustainable by procuring 305910 forest plants amounting of Rs 764775.
- ☞ Mind setting is tremendously broken of the village community and village level institutions by dealing then with strict follow up of project norms, transparency and maximum participation.
- ☞ In the project villages other government development programmes are also in right track.

Agriculture Promotion and Livelihoods:

INHERE believes in conserving and promoting agricultural biodiversity for food and nutrition security of the community. Mountain agriculture has been and should continue to be aligned with nature. Hence organic agriculture should be the natural option for farmers in mountain areas. In addition to being diverse and environment friendly, agriculture systems also need to be made risk resilient to withstand uncertain weather conditions.

INHERE has been promoting self reliant and diversified organic agriculture with use of low cost on farm inputs in agriculture. Value addition to agriculture produce and linkage with markets creates more employment and incomes for the farming household.

In the year 2010-11, the objective of agriculture promotion and creation of livelihoods was carried out through three projects.

Community Livelihood Promotion through Agro diversity Promotion:

The project on livelihood promotion by maintaining bio diversity in Kumaon Himalayas is being facilitated from 2008 and completed in this reporting year 2010-11 with the financial help of Sir Dorab Ji Tata Trust. The main objectives of the project are as follows:

- Promotion of community based sustainable livelihood opportunities.
- Conservation and augmentation of mountain agro diversity.
- Sustainable development and utilization of organic agriculture potential.

The work was executed in 99 old organic certified villages and in 21 new villages of block Syalde, Salt, Bhikiyasen, Chaukhutia and Dwarahat of district Almora. The main activities are:

- Sensitization, awareness creation and motivation of the hill farmers through information dissemination, regular contact and follow up meetings.
- Capacity and skill development for better farming.
- Collection of seed of endangered species of crops and their multiplication.
- Group certification of farmers using internal control system (ICS) under third party certification.
- Promotion of supplementary incomes through allied agriculture activities.
- Aggregation, processing and value addition in small surpluses of small land holder farmers with GMP norms and required legal compliances.
- Developing market linkages for the produce and products

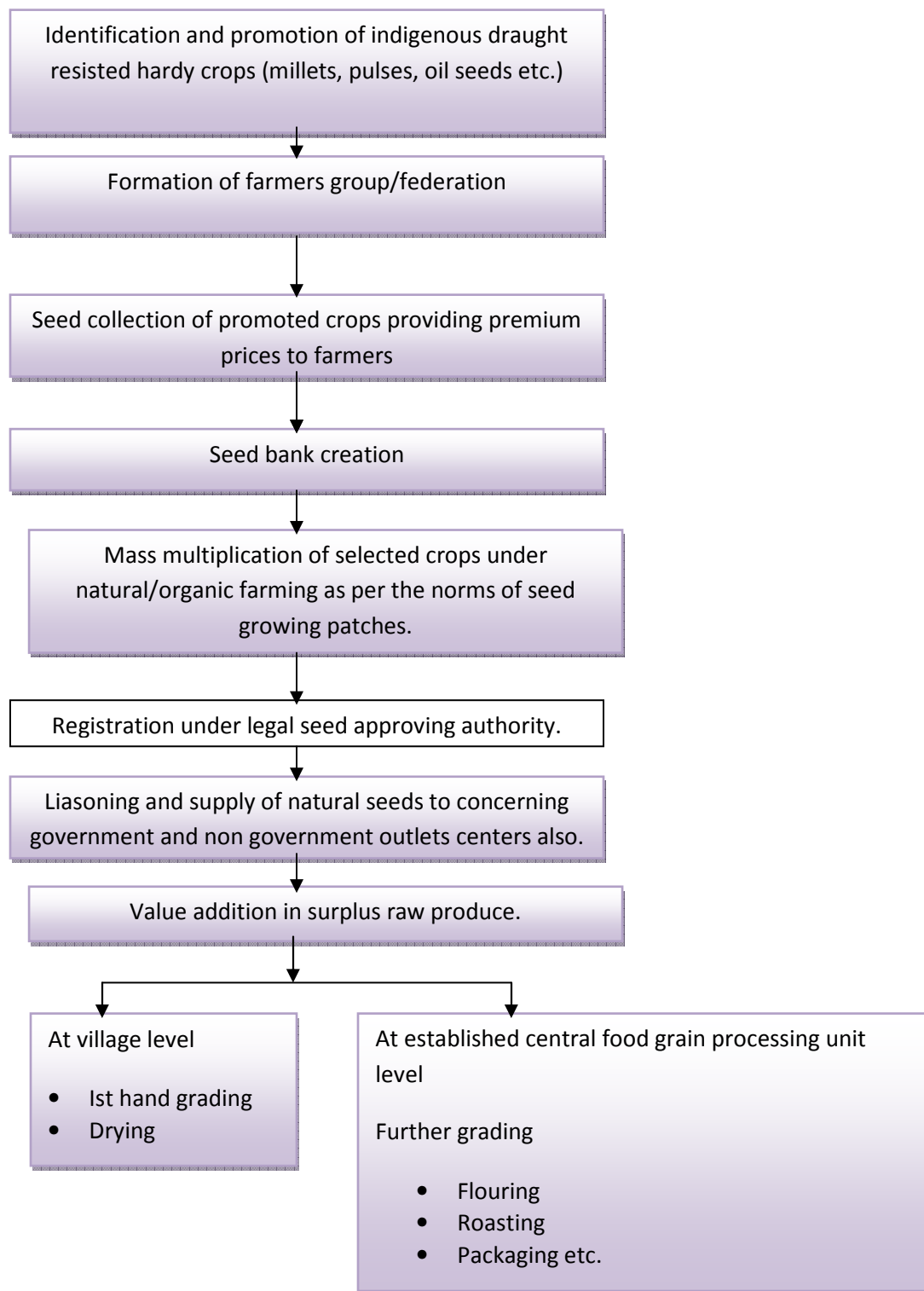

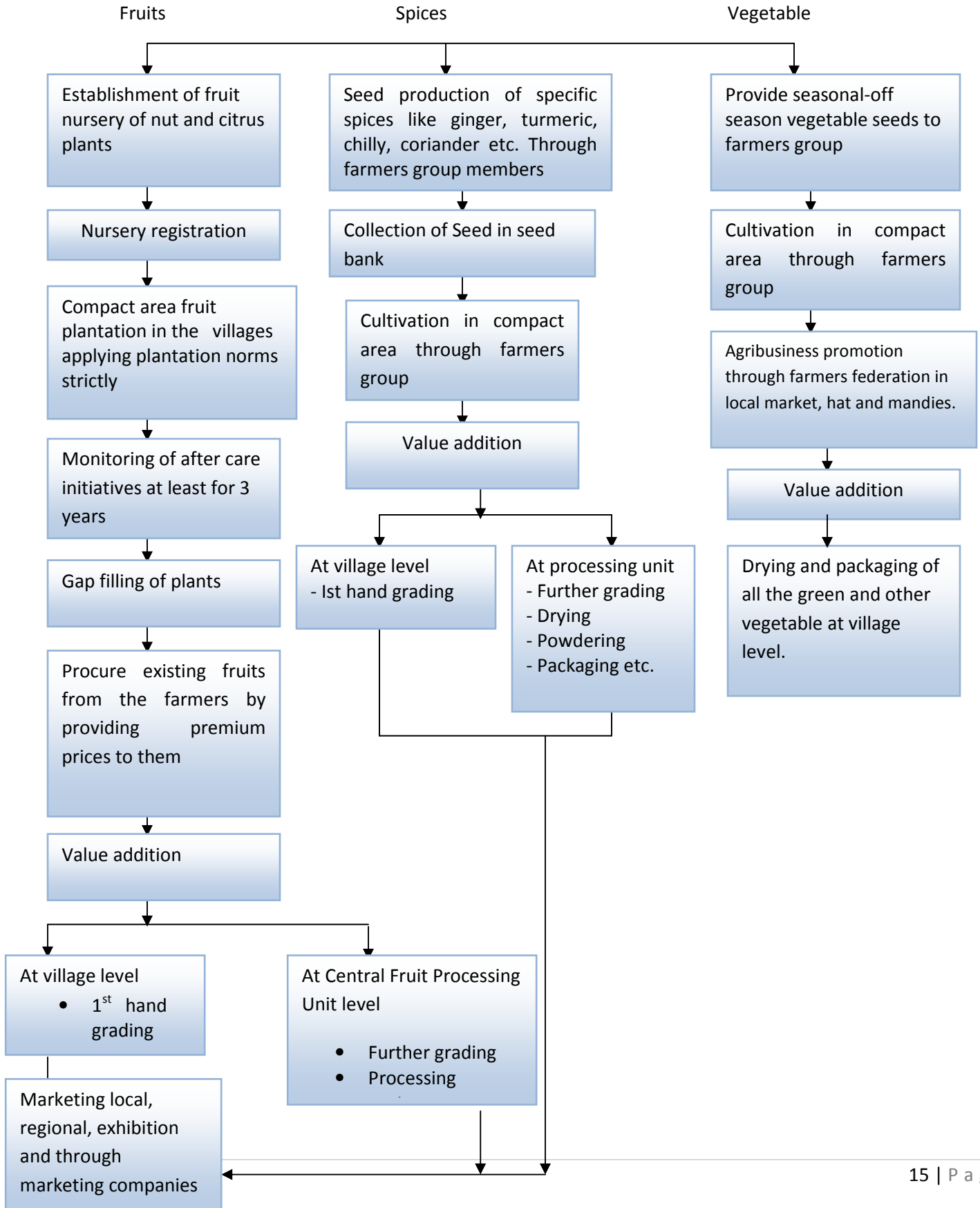

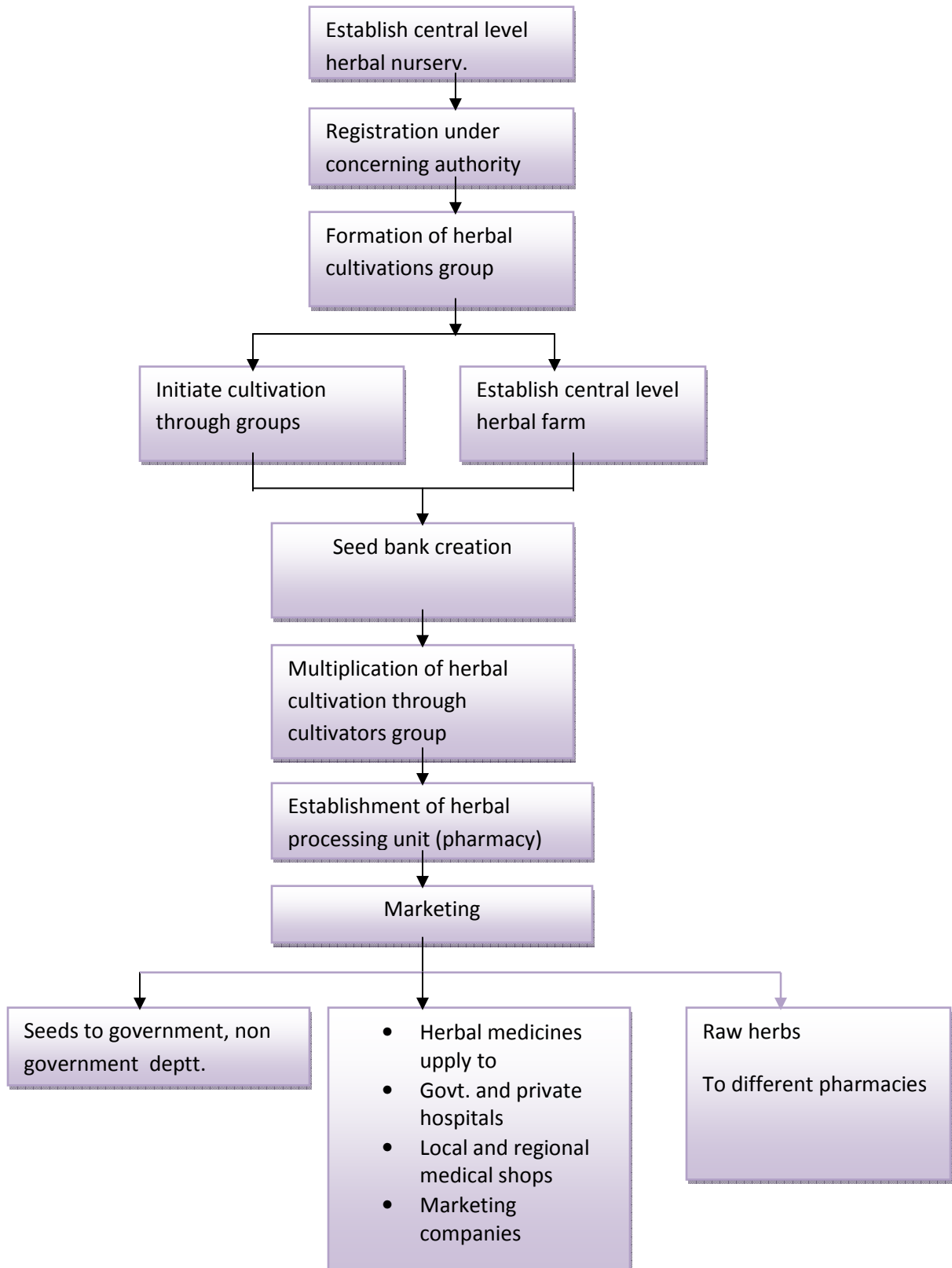

Efforts done under Gramya Project for livelihood enhancement

Under Gramya Project upto 40 % of the total budget of the Gram Panchayat watershed development plan is provisioned to be utilized for livelihood support including off farm income generation activities. For this average per Gram Panchayat budget comes around Rs 37.54lakh. Apart from this, budget for demonstrational activities performed by partner NGO INHERE is separate. Hence livelihood improvement activities have been done in two ways first by Gram Panchayat itself from GP budget cap which is major part and by INHERE under demonstration. The progress achieved under both ways are being given separately in following pages.

Progress achieved by Gram Panchayat –

The main initiatives taken by Gram Panchayat during the reporting period 2010-11 are terrace repairing in 4358.5 cum, krishi minikit in 62.80 ha under which good quality seeds like Wheat, Paddy, Gahat, Soyabean, Lentil, Ragi were provided to the farmers for enhancing agriculture production.

Under horticulture promotion 15 poly house, 131 bio vermin compost units installation, homestead fruit plantation in 75.30 ha, introduction of high value crop/medicinal plants in 9.90 ha and vegetable mini kit in 66.72 ha work was done under which Capsicum, Tomato, Onion, French bean, Okra, Cabbage, Cauliflower good quality seeds were provided.

For live stock development, 265 improved animal shelter, 301 mangers were constructed in 84 revenue villages. Apart from this 57 chaff cutters were also provided to the households of project villages.

Demonstration activities performed by INHERE

Demonstrations were given by INHERE in each of the project villages almost of all the activities which were performed by villagers from their budget as has been shown in following table.

Agribusiness Promotion

Agribusiness promotion is a major and an important activity among all the livelihood initiatives taken under the project that's why it is being described here in brief. First time in the region such a large area was taken under cash crop production. In the year 2010-11 around 35 villages were assisted for agribusiness promotion with an area of 224 ha. The main cash crops promoted were potato- Kufari jyoti, Pea- arkil, Urd- PU-31 & 19, Lentil-PL-4, Radish- Dunagiri local etc. The total production obtained and marketed in the year was 1348 tons amounting of Rs. 179 lakh.

The total agribusiness promoted so far under the project till March 2011 is around of Rs. 350 lakh bringing 400 ha under cash crop. Detail is given in following table –

Activities under taken under Aajivika Pariyojana

Himalaya Aajivika Sudhar Pariyojana is being facilitated in Dhaula Devi block of Almora district. The project is financially supported by IFAD through establishing state and district level project management units. In Dhaula Devi block it was started in April 2007. 25 revenue villages of two Panchayats are getting benefited by this Pariyojana. The main components are self help group formation and strengthening, economic classification of the villages in PRA mode and then to initiate livelihood viable activities with each economic class as per the situation and need of the beneficiary. Main support activities are provide improved agriculture implements, quality seeds, vermi compost unit, animal feeding and water trough, fero and LDEP tanks construction, establish poultry mother unit, organizing health camps, seed capital, good quality fodder grass plants propagation etc. Apart from these organizing meetings, trainings, workshops and exposure visits and fight against social evils are also performed. The achievements gained during the reporting period 2010-11 has been given in following table:

INHERE is working in Champawat district as a partner NGO with anchor implementing agency VPKAS under National Agriculture Innovation Project (NAIP) funded by World Bank. The main objective of the project are as follows :

- Skill up gradation of human resource in creative activities.
- To generate social atmosphere for the development of downtrodden.
- To enhance the efforts for livelihood improvement of the poors and bring them above poverty line.
- To enhance ownership feeling for community assets.
- To bring equity in the society.

Under the project INHERE is facilitating to the farmer community in three cluster of the district named Dharonj, Mudiyani and Chyuromi. Formation of women farmer's self help group and strengthening them at different level is the focus area of the work.

During the reporting period 2010-11 total 188 meetings were organized with the SHGs in which 2360 participants of 7 project villagers participated.

Central level processing units

INHERE has established three central level processing units like 1. Fruit Processing Unit (FPU), 2. Food Grain Processing Unit and 3. Herbal Processing Unit (Sanjeevani Aayurvedshala). These all units are organic certified and following GMP standards. The main aim of establishing these units is to enhance the income of farmers by providing them premium prices of their agriculture produce and aware them against getting exploited by mediators.

During the reporting period 2010-11 total 7134 Kg. raw fruits amounting of Rs. 161757.00 were purchased from the farmers of certified organic villages and total 5875.5 Kg finished products were sold out value of Rs. 919853.00 in regional, national and inter national market by national marketing companies as well as by INHERE.

Under the food grain processing unit, in this year total 13721.5 Kg raw food grain amounting of Rs. 605247.00 was procured from organic certified farmers and total 9408.7 Kg processed food grain value of Rs. 592251.00 was sold out in the market.

Impacts –

- Seeing the tremendous changes and results in the agriculture and agro based livelihood initiatives facilitated by INHERE in the project villages, a number of nearby village which are out of the project area are approaching to INHERE office and requesting for selecting their villages also under the livelihood improvement programme.
- Significant coordination and enthusiasm has been noticed among the farmer group members for bringing the agriculture sector as a main source of income which was just a liability earlier.
- FIGs and other different user groups have started generating their own fund for meeting out the future requirement of agriculture inputs and for repairing the assets generated under the project.
- Self management system in distributing of the irrigation water has been developed by the users group.
- Average 25 % increase has been noticed in agriculture and horticulture crops by inducting improved variety seeds and other required inputs.
- Chemical fertilizer and pesticides have been totally banned in organic certified villages which has certainly improved the soil quality.
- Out side buyers of organic agriculture produce have started coming in certified villages and giving premium prices.
- Farmers have become quite informative and aware of getting exploited by outside buyers.

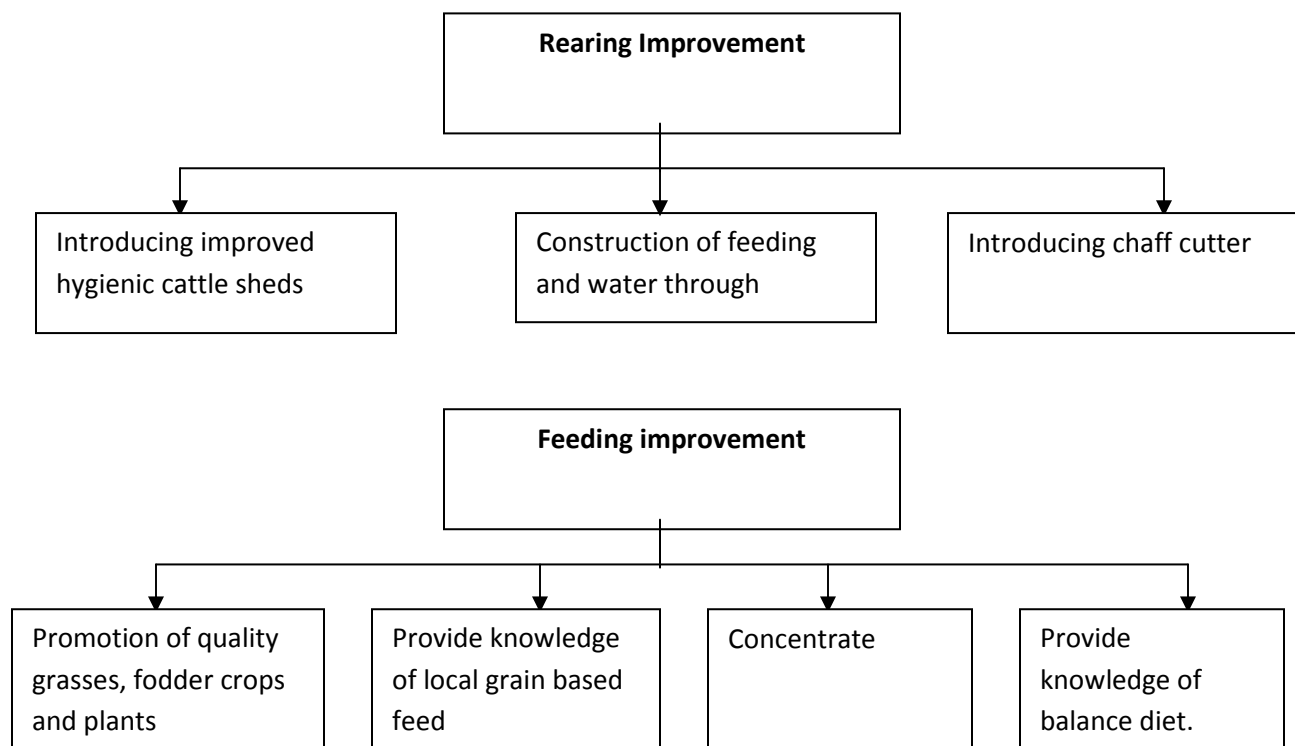
Live Stock Development

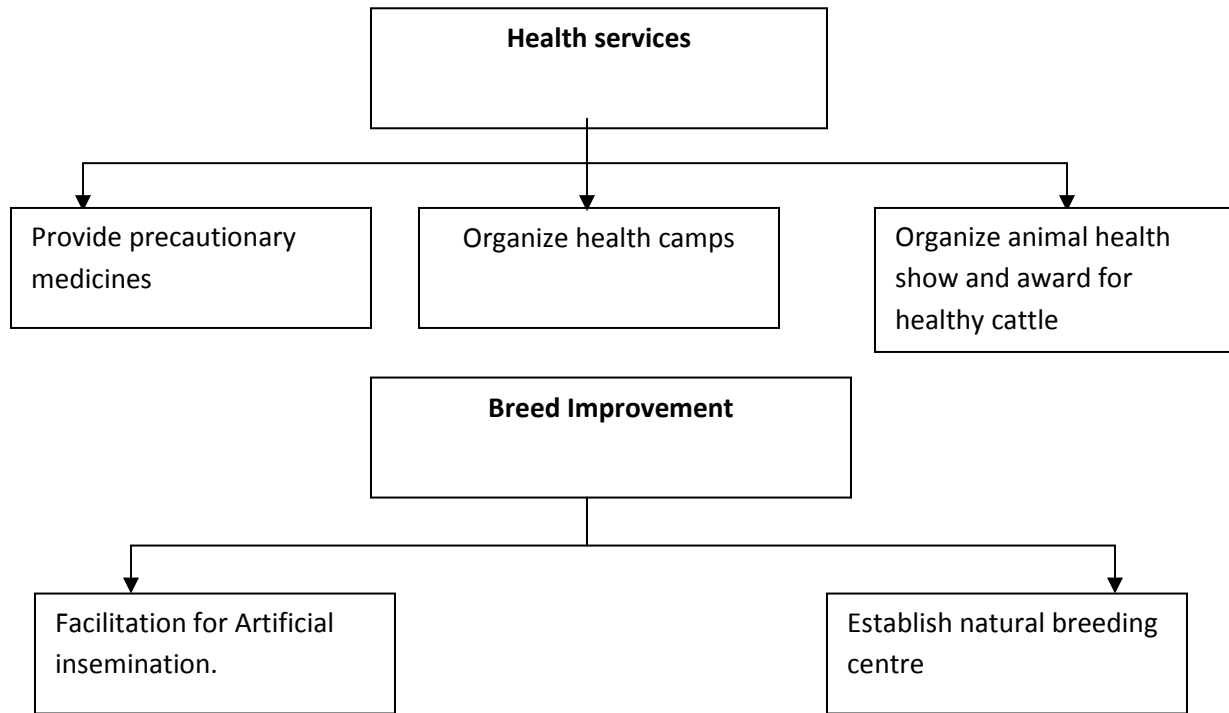
Agriculture and livestock development are closely inter related activity. Without one another can not survive especially in the hills. Agriculture and livestock have always been and still may have great contribution in people's livelihood support. But unfortunately both have become liability of the people due to following reasons:

- Agriculture and animal husbandry have become secondary activity.
- Milching animal are low productive owing to :
 - Poor quality breeds due to inbreeding.
 - Poor and unhygienic rearing conditions.
 - Unavailability of good quality grasses/fodder crops and concentrates.
 - Lack of animal health facilities.
 - Unavailability of quality breeding centre.
- Due priority has not been paid to livestock development by the government.

On account of above constraints, INHERE is trying to bring animal husbandry in the main stream of productive livelihood sources of the area for which following development structure has been chalked out and followed.

Livestock Development





Livestock development initiatives were taken up more intensely mainly under watershed development project (Gramya) but general awareness, motivation and partial help is provided in other Aajeevika based development programs as well.

Under the livestock development initiatives mainly cattleshed improvement construction of feeding and water trough, provide chaff cutter, propagation of good quality fodder crops and grasses organizing health camps/vaccination camps and healthy cattle show camps, establishment of good quality natural breeding centers including goat NBC, establishment of paravet centers, castration scrub bulls, promotion of house hold poultry rearing and linking milk producers with Anchal milk cooperative are been taken.

During the reporting period 2010-11 at two level efforts were done for performing above initiatives 1st at INHERE level as demonstration and another level at Gram Panchayat from their fund. In this year under demonstration 50 improved cattle sheds were constructed in which proper ventilation, flooring and drainage have been kept into consideration, apart from these 30 mangers and 10 chaff cutters have also been demonstrated. For better health 5000 animals were vaccinated and 10 health cams were also organized. Under the Gram Panchayat budget 265 cattle shed were constructed cumulatively this figure has gone upto 1256 nos. Along with this during this year 301 managers, 57 chaff cutters were also installed. Detail is been given in following table:

Water :

INHERE is well recognized not only in district but also in state as well for water harvesting through different techniques in the Himalayan set up like hand pump installation (from 1989), low cost minor lift, gravity water schemes, roof and ground rain water harvesting etc. Safe drinking water is a basic human need. INHERE continues to give priority to safe drinking water and has implemented programs on water and sanitation almost since its inception.

At present INHERE is facilitating Himmothan Pariyojana in the village of Almora district which is funded by Sir Ratan Tata Trust in the state of Uttarakhand. INHERE started water and sanitation work from Oct. 2007 under Himmothan Pariyojana. In this financial year in all the selected 8 villages safe drinking water schemes completed.

Objectives of water and sanitation programme.

Encourage and promote sustainable health and hygiene practices by providing safe drinking water and environmental sanitation services.

Explore and generate alternative sustainable and eco friendly by livelihood opportunities in the hills.

Encourage and promote environmental conservation practices by conserving fragile catchments areas and developing watersheds.

During the reporting period 2010-11 all the 9 gravity schemes in 8 villages were completed successfully. The chief project manager from SRTT, Bombay visited the project villages and was highly satisfied seeing the quality work done. The detail of water schemes constructed in 8 villages has been given in the following table.

INHERE promotes accessible, affordable and sustainable community health care through an integrated approach of preventive as well as curative measures. Under preventive measures INHERE emphasizes health awareness meetings, workshops, trainings, campaign and exposures along with immunization support. The main target beneficiaries are infant and small children, school going children, pregnant and lactating mothers, adolescent girls and old persons.

Under curative measures INHERE runs day care health OPD system both static and mobile. INHERE has a team of a qualified Ayurvedic and Allopathic doctors with paramedical staff. It promotes traditional health parishioners for health care accessibility in remote area, encourages medicinal plants and herbs cultivation and also runs a small pharmacy for supply for quality Aayurvedic medicines to the health system. INHERE has an ambulance service for emergency and referral cases. Following have been the main areas of INHERE's Community Health Programme in the reporting year.

Main programme area of community health of INHERE :

- Awareness creation among people regarding health and RCH issues.
- Support to health practitioner.
- Training to ASHA and Village Health Committee members.
- Curative health care service through static and mobile health system.
- Referral and emergency services to villagers.
- Strengthen traditional system of medicine by encouraging herbs and medicinal plants cultivation in the area.

Health Services:

INHERE has endeavored to provide accessible and affordable health services in the region.

INHERE Medical Centre runs OPD services for common diseases and minor ailments. For major health problem and cronic diseases our aim is early identification of disease and appropriate referral to higher centers of health care. The centre also provided DOTs treated under the revised National Tuberculosis Programme (RNTCP) and MDT treatment for leprosy patients under nation health programme in previous year.

Emergency services are also provided to the community. The tables below give information on the service given in 2010-11.

Mobile Health Clinic (Dr. Headgear Arogya Rath) :

Under MNGO Scheme INHERE provide preventive and curative health care through a mobile health clinic in unnerved and practically served remote areas of block Salt and Syalde of district Almora. 24 health camps are organized in a month in identified 12 camp sites. Mobile Health Clinic has pathology and X-Ray facilities with a qualified medical team like Allopathic doctor and subordinate team. The service imparted in 2010-11 through this clinic is given in following table.

Health initiatives taken under Himmothan pariyojana:

Hygiene and Sanitation Awareness Activities

During the year various hygiene and sanitation awareness campaigns were organized with more community involvement. Regular cleanup drives were carried out in all the clusters/villages. Total **132** cleanliness campaigns were conducted in which **2283** villagers participated.

During these campaigns mainly community places, village foot paths, drains, traditional water sources, schools and other common places were cleaned. SARAR tools were also used for sensitizing the community and to disseminate information.

Different HESA sessions on personal hygiene, domestic hygiene, environmental hygiene, mother and child health, hygiene use of drinking water, use of waste water, importance of potable water, first aid, water borne diseases, immunization, importance of latrine, diarrhea management, fecal oral route transmission diseases organized.

In the month of Jan. 2011, XIIIth healthy home survey was conducted in coordination with the community. A total of **255** households were surveyed out of total of 258 households. Rejuvenation of Traditional Health Practices and Promotion of cultivation of Medicinal Plants for Domestic Health Use

The thrust of this project is to promote accessible and low cost health services through revitalization of community based traditional system of medicine. The Project is supported by the GB Pant of Himalaya environment and development, Kosi, Katarmal (Almora).

The main objective of the project are:

- To provide early accessible and low cost health services through revitalization of local community based traditional system of medicine.
- To aware local community for conservation and cultivation of medicinal plants.
- To document local knowledge based traditional health card.

During the reporting period two meetings were organized with traditional health practitioners and medicinal plants cultivators. In these meetings total 57 participants were benefited. The main issues of these meetings were MPs cultivation, Health camps organization, identification of new THPs and MPs etc.

Two trainings were also organized in this year with THPs and MPs cultivators in which 53 participants were benefited.

In this 3 health camps were organized in which 89 patents were treated. Apart from these activities 15 Nali land was brought under medicinal plants cultivation by 6 farmer of 5 villages. Detail is shown in following tables:

Human Resource Development

Human resource is the first stake holders in development venture and empowerment of it is the first step for achieving success in development initiative, sustaining it and its process. Strengthening of knowledge and skill base of rural communities enable them to be more effective in influencing factors directly affecting their life and well being such as planning, implementation and maintenance of the assets generated. In the mountain villages women are the main work force in the villages and backbone of village economy. But unfortunately they are least recognized in social, economic and political sphere. Keeping this in mind INHERE is working to strengthen women by providing platform and opportunities to come together for leadership and solve their socio economic and political problems themselves. Hence INHERE is trying to support women in forming their self help groups from 1994 and is the first organization in the district to start this initiative. Although mahila mangal dal, yuwak mangal dal etc having been formed earlier also but self help concept was not their and in result they become defunct within short span of time. Following are the main objectives of forming SHGs and other village institutions as well having self help concept.

- Provide women a common platform for greater strength and voice to create more opportunities for them and to present themselves more effectively and confidently in life.
- Prepare women for taking decisions independently at all levels and raise voice against injustice and rightly.
- Prepare women to take up village development work with panchayats and other local institutions independently.
- More women participation in panchayat elections.
- To ensure more women in leadership, management and protection of their natural resources.
- Link SHGs with banks and other financial institutions for self employment and create income opportunity and enhance their capacity and skill.

From 1994 INHERE started forming self help groups in the villages and efforts done for empower them from different angles. The SHG formed in the first decade are now working independently and sustaining them self by their own efforts. The total SHGs formed so far till March 2011 are 540 in 315 villages of 11 development blocks in district Almora, 3 development blocks of district Champawat and one block Gairsen in district Chamoli. The total members involve in their SHG are 8585 and total deposits has been calculated as Rs 8402832. The SHG detail till March 2011 is given in the table below.
